WATER-WISE IRRIGATION TIPS FOR FALL

This fall is the perfect time to prepare for the cooler, rainy season ahead. Making a few simple adjustments to your irrigation system, and adding some new landscaping options to your game plan can save water and save you money.



Be sure to reduce your irrigation system's run time as the weather cools, and turn it off when the rainy season begins. Most plants are in their slow-growth or dormant phase during the winter and seasonal rains often provide all the water they need.

Smart irrigation controllers are great for helping you manage irrigation scheduling throughout the year. With proper installation, programming, and maintenance, these self-adjusting controllers can reduce overwatering by delivering just the right amount of water your plants need.

Now is also the time to think about rain barrels—a water-smart option that provides reusable irrigation water for your landscaping needs. Rain

barrels capture and store rainwater runoff from your rain gutters, and provide water for landscaping. Capturing and reusing rainwater reduces the flow of storm runoff, minimizing runoff pollutants and benefiting the environment.

Marin Water offers some excellent rebates to help you get started. Install a qualifying WaterSense smart irrigation controller at your home or business and receive a rebate of up to \$100. Purchase and install a rain barrel, and receive a rebate of up to 50 cents per gallon of storage—that's \$25 for a 50-gallon barrel.

PREPARING FOR POWER SHUTOFFS

The fall wildfire season also means preparing for PG&E's Public Safety Power Shutoffs (PSPS). Marin Water uses electricity to power treatment plants and pump stations. To prepare for PSPS events, we have emergency plans ready and portable generators set, to keep your water flowing.

Conserving water during a power shutoff reduces demand on our generators and our system, and


CLIMATE: CHANGE AND RESILIENCE


